But when she was empty, if she found a loving community of faith like this one, it would also be a joy as serving together would fill her back up. The tiny stitches themselves could represent this as the thread is drawn all the way out and then back again, stitch after stitch. And then I shared "A Blessing for the Inward Way" by Tracy Shaw.

In March, we have been here eight years and I had just signed up for a continuing education seminary on the long pastorate because I am hoping to keep my ministry vital here for another eight years, God willing. The three month sabbatical for us next summer is part of the best practices of congregations and pastors who have successful long term ministries. Special Congregational Meeting Needed July 8th Following Worship

Approval is needed for \$7,349 expenditure to sealcoat, fill cracks, repair north entrance, and re-stripe our parking lot. Council already approved the repair of the north entrance for \$500 which will then be applied toward the contract if approved.

In June Steve Moe connected us to Clay Constantine with Seal King who was doing some asphalt work for him in Lake City. Because his crew was already going to be in the area, he said he could fix the north entrance where the asphalt did not come up even to the cement pad on Tuesday June 26th for no charge if we signed a contract with them for the sealcoating. The council did not believe it had authorization to spend this much money without congregational approval so we agreed to pay the \$500 cost for the repair and if the congregation authorized the

contract for sealcoating we would then be credited this amount toward their bid. The quote also includes free striping (\$400 value).

It is recommended that we sealcoat every 2-3 years to prevent further more costly damage over time. The last time we did this was Sept 2015 for a total cost of \$9,960. We anticipate that this meeting will not require a long discussion since we have been diligent about saving for capital expenses such as this.

Worship Survey Coming Soon

Our worship committee strives to create moments of experiencing God's transformational grace and direction so that our lives are enriched to be a blessing to others. This lofty goal however requires attention to some rather routine questions.

For instance, Carol and Brad dedicate a lot of thought to which hymns we sing on each Sunday. They look at the Scripture lesson for the day and find hymns which reinforce the lesson. They also try to expand our song repertoire by including some hymns with which we might not be as familiar along with some favorites. We'll be asking in the coming weeks for your favorite hymns to try to include in this planning. We also want to encourage anyone who has a musical gift to spend some time preparing some piece for an offering. Each offering is not only beautiful in itself but also represents hours of practice and devotion. Just let us know what you're working on and when you anticipate being ready to share it.

Another thing that we are already giving thought to is what time might be best to worship this winter. We're already planning to go to one service for the Sunday after Christmas and the month of January. We have tried various schedules over the years. We think going to one service for this time might make the most sense because of our annual meeting. The question we have is whether to meet at 9 a.m. as we do in the summer months or whether a later time might be preferable in winter. If we keep it at 9 a.m. we have a consistency in time that is one fewer thing to remember. If we go later, 10 a.m. or 10:30 a.m., we might have more people who can make it out on cold snowy days. We look forward to hearing your thoughts in the coming months. Our Sunday School is also going to take this time as a hiatus from classes so that we can finish stronger in the spring.



Large Screen Television Wanted for S.S.

We're looking for a 70" or larger television to use for our children's program in worship and Sunday School practices.

Currently we print words to songs on poster board and hold them up in the front row for the kids to be reminded of the words. If we can find a suitable television to go up in the back corner of the worship space, the kids can see the words in front of them without distraction for the congregation. We will also find a few other uses for it as cues for other worship leaders, but we don't want to buy a new television or projector which will cost over \$1,500. We don't need a high quality set for the limited purpose which we envision for it. We can easily run a 50' hdmi cord to that back corner for little expense. And there is already a four foot deep shelf for it to sit on. If you are considering upgrading your current large screen television, let us know if we can see if your old one might suit our needs.




July 2018

Well, June just FLEW by! It was a busy month filled with Vacation Bible School, preparations for the youth gathering in Houston, fundraisers, worship, bible studies, and preaching. By the time this gets sent out to you, I will be in Texas with 30,000 youth from around the country, learning, serving, and hopefully laughing with our group! It has been a full month.

When things get busy, it is my tendency to put my nose down and keep at the work. I take less time for reflection, my patience wears thin, and my perspective about this work in ministry gets a bit skewed. When I get too focused on the tasks at hand, I miss the "work of the people" that I am lucky enough to call a job.

The theme of this year's youth gathering is "This Changes Everything" – with daily topics titled "Grace...", "Hope..." and "Jesus Changes Everything." I've been thinking about this theme as I've navigated a month with a lot of *doing* and not enough *being*. When I first considered the concept of how faith changes us, it made me think about how if we let our faith truly form us, action on behalf of the gospel will inevitably follow. Action inspired by faith is certainly an important Christian calling as we step out in the world. To love as Jesus loved is so essential and so often involves action. This is good.

However, sometimes too much action, too many activities, too many tasks – even if they are for good causes (even for the church!) can distract us from God's goodness. I know that when I get buried in my activities, when I fill up my calendar and constantly seek control over my circumstances, these are the weeks or seasons when I feel farthest from God. When I can quiet myself and sit still, this is when I can more closely understand that my goodness comes from God alone and not from the success of any of my work. For the rest of this summer season, I seek to spend just as much time dwelling in God's presence as I do acting on behalf of God's kingdom. Because stillness is good too.



What I'm Reading...

Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption

By Bryan Stevenson

Woah. This book took me to church! By that, I mean that it opened my eyes to some of the shocking patterns of our criminal justice system. I've had this book on my shelf for the past year or so, and when I found out that Bryan Stevenson was a speaker for the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston, I knew it was time to finally bring it to the top of my pile. I am so glad I did.

Stevenson is a lawyer who works for a non-profit agency that works to get innocent people off of death row in Alabama. He manages to tell the heartbreaking stories of many of his clients, teach about broken parts of our legal and justice systems, and still find moments to offer hope. This is a heavy read. It is hard to hear real stories of people, many of whom were children or mentally ill, who have been victims to our criminal justice system. If you choose to read it, I would love to talk with you about it.


Please bring peanut butter this month to our food shelf in the Welcome Center.
